

# Year 9 Options Process 2022-2024

Dear Parent/Guardian,

At this time of the academic year, Year 9 students begin the process of selecting their Key Stage 4 curriculum. At Kings College, we are continually reviewing our curriculum to ensure that we offer our students breadth, balance, and choice. Our final option blocks have been formulated as a result of the initial student interest.

Your child must study the mandatory core subjects. These include some 'non-qualification subjects' which do not have any exams and do not lead to a certificate. However, it is important that your child studies these courses as they will help develop the wider knowledge and skills needed for their future.

# The core subjects are:

- English GCSE
- English Literature GCSE
- Mathematics GCSE
- Science Trilogy GCSE (worth two GCSEs)

### Non-qualification core subjects:

- PSHE (includes careers, sex and relationships education, health and wellbeing)
- Religious Education
- Physical Education (core PE)

Your child must choose **three** of the following options. There must be **one** option from **each** of the following blocks:

Your child should think about the following when choosing their options:

- Which subjects do they enjoy?
- What are their learning strengths and skills and which subjects do these go well with?
- Does the balance between coursework and examinations suit them?

Your child should not choose a subject because:

- They like the teacher the teacher may not be teaching that class next year.
- Their friend is choosing it they may end up in a different class to their friend.

In the following weeks your child will have a 1-1 meeting with a member of staff and have the opportunity to discuss the options available. After this point we will send out final options forms for completion.

Every option form will be checked by Mr Bland and if there are any concerns regarding your child's option choices, you will be contacted to discuss further. We are keen to work in partnership with you at this key time, so that your child makes the most appropriate choices for their future. - Opportunities to write for a range of audiences and purposes, adapting style to form and to real-life contexts in, for example, letters, articles, reviews, speeches, etc.
- Formal presentation or speech

### **Overview of Content:**

- 'Macbeth.' Learners will be expected to comment on Shakespeare's use of language, structure and form and show an understanding of key themes, characters, and ideas within the text.
- Knowledge, understanding and comparison of poetry from 1789 to the present day.
- 'An Inspector Calls' Learners will comment on the use of language, structure and form in a text that, whilst on the surface may appear to be a simple detective story, poses deeper questions about social responsibility and our duty to our fellow man.
- 'A Christmas Carol' students will engage with the context of the Victorian era and use their understanding of another time period to influence the way they interpret characters, plotlines, themes and ideas in a story that challenges perceptions of poverty.



# **Component 1 Overview:**

The written examination consists of two sections. Section A is assessed on the core content of the design Technology course. Section B is assessed on the Timber material category.

The content is divided into two sections: core content and material categories. The core content provides students with a breadth of study across Design Technology and the material categories will be based on the material used for Component 2.

### **Component 2 Overview:**

Students will undertake a project based on a contextual challenge released a year before certification. The project will test students' skills in investigating, designing, making and evaluating a prototype of a product. Tasks will be internally assessed and externally moderated. The marks are awarded for each part as follows. **Investigate** (16 marks), **Design** (42 marks), **Make** (36 marks), & **Evaluate** (6 marks).
